



The Language of Design

Balance and flow were the watchwords for designer Hi Karsh in this stylish and well-considered interior project

designer and their customer is usually the secret of any successful project. It has certainly central to the story of this hause located in the Haifa area in Israel. In this case the customer was Tova & Zila architects and the interior designer Hillt hash from Hillt Interior Design.

Hillit entered the process right from the start at the architectural conceptual setch stage, through the entire work process including functional design, planning and plastering, carpentry, and lighting design, right through to the selection of interior and exterior mishing materials and styling. In fact, his involvement continued pretty much antil the new tenant moved in to the property.

The house stood on the plot of 700 se m, with the property itself stretching over 230 sq m on one floor plus a basement. The concept was a tailor-made home for a young family: a couple and their three daughters.

Hillit's toolbox contains an interesting wricty of instruments from many sources: by design is modern by nature and uses function, structure and materials in a direct way, and yet tries to be original, clean and especially personal," Hilit explains.

"It was important for me to create a dialogue between parts of the house and, in doing so, create a harmony and language for the house as a whole."

The architectural design of the house is built around a central patio which somehow seems to strenghten the connection and continuity between the interior and exterior. Basalt stone was selected by Hilit to cover the front entrance and the patio wall space, and it continues into the house through the patio windows.

The patio is in front of the door and from one side is in the public space, the living room and dining kitchen area. On the other side of the patio is the private area, a bedroom and a bathroom. To highlight the central axis of the patio, Hilit created a mirror image, a plaster element which casts light over the kitchen slot located just above the kitchen island, and which is a feature that appears as an echo on the other side of the house above the dining room to create a dialogue between the left and right side of the house.















This element is decorative plaster, and yet it is also highly functional as a space to house the air conditioning mechanism.

The lighting design comes in plasterbuilt elements to highlight the architecture of the house, with the lights themselves concealed wherever possible. This enables important architectural features to remain as uninterrupted focal points – such as the window of light that the architects created over the patio – even at night once the daylight has gone.

The very spacious living area is designed around the fireplace. All furniture and carpentry elements selected for the space was chosen to best create a natural flow and emphasis for the room which has a ceiling height of 3.7m.

Hilit's choices of material and colour are based on natural substances that contribute a feeling of space. The walls were painted light grey, floor tiles also in various grey shades, fixed furniture such as kitchen, dining room, living room sideboard and bedroom with white. Flashes of colour do however make an appearance - touches of purple can be found in the textiles, wallpapers and in a photograph taken by Hilit which is hung above the living room sofa.

The combination of wallpapers is designed to emphasize certain walls to create a greater awareness of the space.
